Heidi's Tomato Salad



4-5 medium tomatoes (garden fresh are best) halved, thinly sliced

1/2 c. chopped sweet onion (or more, to taste)

1-2 green onions, sliced

Parsley, (fresh is best, but dried is okay) to taste

1 tsp. fresh lemon juice

1 T. good olive oil

1/2 tsp. sugar, or to taste

1/4-1/2 tsp. dill (fresh is best, but dried is okay), to taste

Garlic salt, to taste

Onion salt, to taste

Opt. add a splash of Braggs liquid aminos for saltiness and flavor

Blend all together, taste, and adjust seasonings to your liking. Let steep for an hour or so to blend the flavors - will get juicy.

Add anything you like from your garden to make it your own.

NOTE: This is a little like fresh pico de gallo, but my German family called it "Tomaten Salat".

The Most Important Bible Teaching

This year we have been sharing a sermon series called "The Most Important Things." With the chaos of the world lately it felt appropriate to focus on the things in life and in the Bible that God feels are the most important.

This brought to my mind a head scratcher of a trivia question. What is the most important teaching in the Bible? Do you know? The Bible has so much to say about God, about salvation and about life. But what is the most important teaching? What is the #1 crucial belief to our faith?

There's the Sabbath teaching of rest from our works and connection with God and fellow humans. But as important as those beliefs are, they are not the most important.

Maybe you would suggest our teaching about the end of times and the understanding of Bible prophecy are the most important teaching of the Bible. Certainly it was an understanding of God's plan as seen in Bible prophecy that first awoke a desire in me to learn more about God. And learning about how God will finish the story of the Great Controversy on this world helps us know how everything will end. But that's not the most important teaching of the Bible.

Perhaps the music group the Beatles got it right so many years ago when they sang, "All Ya Need is Love." Maybe love is the most important teaching of the Bible. Certainly love is the greatest ethic in the Bible. Love is how we should live our lives. Other-centered love is what God wants to give to all of us and should affect all our choices in life. And as the Bible declares in 1 John 4:8, "God is love." So we could definitely argue that love is the greatest teaching of the Bible. However other faiths and religions would argue that they also teach and encourage love even though they don't follow the Bible.

So what is the most important teaching of the Bible? The teaching that influences our love and reveals God's ultimate love? The Apostle Paul told us which teaching is the most important. Paul determined that without this teaching we have nothing and our faith is in vain. According to Paul, the most important teaching in the Bible is — the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

"But if there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ is not risen. And if Christ is not risen, then our preaching is empty and your faith is also empty." 1 Corinthians 15:13 - 14. Paul tells his readers that if Jesus Christ did not rise from the dead, then Christianity falls apart. He says without the resurrection our faith is empty. It is Christ's victory over death that reveals God's power of love to defeat sin. According to Paul the resurrection of Jesus Christ is the most important teaching for our faith.
