



Walking Food Kits (small back-packs containing one meal, numerous snacks, water, and a sharing book) have been provided to the People's City Mission/Homeless Ministry to take on the #21 Bus to people living under bridges and other unhoused individuals in Lincoln.

Donated canned goods that cannot currently be included in Little Free Pantries due to freezing weather are being donated to the People's City Mission Help Center while dry goods that are donated continue to be placed in Little Free Pantries.

Total items donated to date is 3,000!



A CHECKLIST FOR MORTALS

Author and Piedmont church member, Becky Daniel, has written a book, A Checklist for Mortals, to help people prepare for death in a way that cares for their loved ones after the event. She shares: When my father passed away in 2016, I was appalled at the lack of easy to -navigate resources to help my brother and I close the estate. I called my mother to vent (of course). And she interrupted to ask me for a favor. "Take notes," my mother said. "I want to know how to make the process easier for you and your brother when I die." This sparked 30+ interviews to see if there were common steps every person (regardless of their individual situation) could take to be ready for Death. I spoke with will executors, funeral directors, probate lawyers, accountants, hospice workers, those working with veterans, and countless friends and relatives to learn from their experiences. I was able to identify a death checklist with 10 steps that adults can habitually do (just like paying bills or washing socks) that will make death (already a complicated emotional process) a lot less stressful for the family. Implementing this death checklist is the best gift you can give your spouse, child, parent, sibling, or friend. I encourage you to start today. Let the last memories of you be of your warmth and laughter, not the months of trying to hack into your phone to pay your final bills. 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THE EYE OF THE NEEDLE GATE

I have never seen it my self but have read about it in the Bible and on the Internet. In Jerusalem there is something called "The Eye of the Needle Gate". As you can see in the photo, there is a larger door and a smaller door in the city wall.

Why would the ancient cities have two doors in the wall, one inside of the other? According to Google the "Eye of the Needle" Gate was used after the large gate was shut at nightfall. The large gate needed to be shut for safety reasons. The little gate was to allow legitimate night travelers into the city. It was so small, however, that the camel drivers would have to remove all the packs from the camels in order for the camel to kneel and squeeze through the short, small gate. You can imagine it would be difficult but not impossible for the camel to get through the gate. After the camel was through, the camel drivers could take the packs into the city.

In Matthew 19:16-26 we find the story of the Rich Young Ruler and the Kingdom of God. While Jesus is teaching, a wealthy young man spoke, asking Jesus how he could obtain eternal life? Jesus said that the young man should keep the commandments. The rich young ruler assured Jesus that he had faithfully kept all the commandments always, but wondered what he still lacked. Jesus informed the young man that in order to be perfect he must sell his possessions and give to the poor and then invited the young man to come and follow Him. He said it would be easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of heaven.

Let us get to the kernel of the story. God is not against us having possessions or having plenty. He promises to provide our needs and often allows us to have extra. Jesus was pleased that the young man had kept the ten commandments. Perhaps the spirit of the question the one man asked is what prompted the added requirement. Was the rich young ruler asking out of love for God and care for Others? It seems that what the young man asked was for himself saying, "Lord, what shall I do to so that I may obtain eternal life?" It is ok for us to desire eternal life, yet it is even better to ask what we can do to serve God and ask Him how we can help any or all of His children as we journey through life now. As we serve God cheerfully, out of worship and desire to be in His service, eternal life will follow automatically because we love God and are in unity with God and His plans. (1 John 5:12) "Whoever has Jesus, has Eternal Life"
